2005 World Youth Day

Before the 48 of us pilgrims left from the Diocese of Madison for WYD Bishop Morlino asked us to be open and pray for a gift. He said a gift will be given to those that look with eyes of faith upon Pope Benedict XVI as St. Peter or the disciple upon whom Christ will build His church. I was blessed to see the Pope on a couple of occasions: one was the world gathering of seminarians and formatters, and the other was at the vigil and mass of WYD. At both times I experienced the pope not as a person, but more as a disciple through whom Christ guides His church. In no way could any human being bring together so

many young people and affect them as they were affected. The reactions of young people in the presence of the Holy Father varied from tears to silent awe all leading people to the Lord. Pope Benedict guided us young people by the words he spoke and the gospel that he preached. I came away with a great gift of humility by seeing the fullness of the church.

The greatness of the church was evident in the number and diversity of young people, the unity during adoration and mass, and the humility of Pope Benedict XVI. Our Response: Hurricane Katrina

With winds reaching 175 mph and gusts up to 215 mph, hurricane Katrina tore through the southern United States, leaving in its wake thousands dead, millions homeless, and billions of dollars worth of damage. The Louisiana city of New Orleans was hit hardest, being completely overwhelmed and flooded. Katrina was the costliest and most destructive natural disaster in U.S. history. It seemed to temporarily cast America into utter chaos. In it's wake, many are asking the question why? Why is something like this allowed to happen? Why now? And the question that we

here at IHM asked of ourselves, what can we as people of God, especially as seminarians, do to respond?

Some confusion always seems to arise after a disaster in which lives are lost and so many are left homeless and displaced. In the midst of so much disorder, people find themselves not only questioning what can be done to help, but also why such an evil event could be allowed to happen to so many people. It can be hard to understand and even harder to explain to people. But, we as Christians, know that God only allows suffering when an even greater good can come from it. It may be too early yet to see what God has in store, but I think it is safe to say one good thus far has been the response. People from all over the country and even from foreign countries have done their part to help in the rescue, and care of those who survived.

Either by giving of money or time, thousands have already participated in the recovery of the Katrina ravaged areas of this country.

IHM was also quick to respond by taking up a collection to help financially. We also extended a welcome to our brother seminarians from New Orleans who were displaced by offering them housing in our extra rooms here at IHM seminary. But we also have understood that the power of prayer was not to be underestimated. We have been praying for our brother seminarians and for all those affected by Katrina. The IHM community still continues to offer our prayers for the victims. Praying, not only for their physical well being, but also for their spiritual well being. May this suffering not dishearten the faithful but instead strengthen them as they seek the divine assistance of God. •

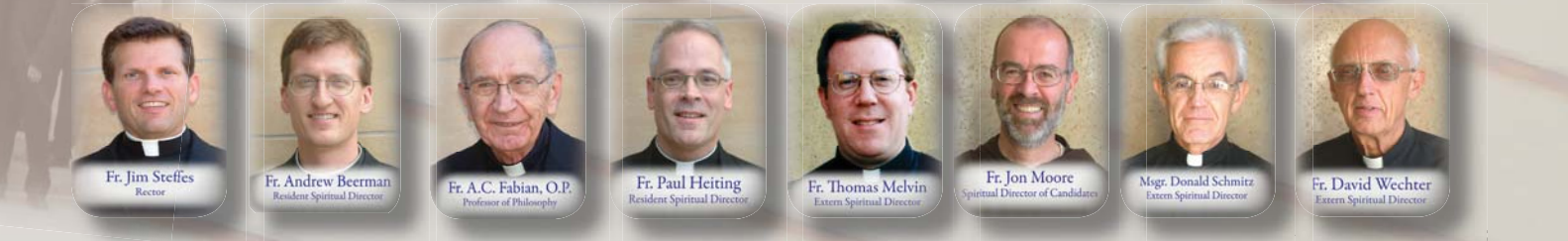

we were there when the footings were poured, and we watched those bricks laid one on top of the other. We were so excited...we knew when we came back for our senior year, we would be in the brand spanking new Immaculate Heart of Mary Seminary!”

But as fate would have it, the building was not ready at the start of the school

In the spring semester of this last academic year I found myself searching for a different summer experience. In past summers I had always returned home to western South Dakota to put up hay on my family's cattle ranch. Driving a tractor in circles for endless hours, I had time to contemplate the deeper mysteries of life. And, with no cab or a/c I could work on my tan! But being a seminarian, my tanning days were quickly fading into the past. I had an urge to cut loose from the ranch and see the world. But what could a ranch hand from western South Dakota do in such a complex world? To begin my search I began asking myself “who am I?”

In my seminary classes I had grown fond of philosophy. I also had an interest in the German language. So I thought it would

be interesting to take summer courses in these topics. Dr. Poling, one of my philosophy professors, told me that when he was in college he had studied German at the Goethe Institute in Germany!

Curious, I began an enquiry on what it would take. One advantage of studying in Germany was that I was planning to be there in August for World Youth Day with my diocese. I could sign up for the July session at the Geothe Institute and then meet my diocese in Munich to go to WYD.

All seemed to be falling into place... financial aid was available, I could continue the German studies at a local university when I returned to the states, and I could enjoy WYD with my diocese. Yet, amidst all the positives, anxiety and fear set in. But, by the grace of God, I happened to tell this to a couple of my professors. They both said that I would never regret learning a new language

and experiencing a different culture. With their encouragement, I began to re-question my purpose for going to Germany. I knew I was a seminarian and that I loved studying philosophy. But in what direction was my life heading? Well, the obvious answer was that I was heading towards God. And, during my time at the seminary, it seems that God has been directly me more specifically to teaching. How does one become a better teacher? I concluded that learning a second language and seeing a new culture would be an experience that would add to my ability to express ideas and broaden others experiences. With these thoughts in mind, I went to Germany.

This experience turned out be one of the most growing and revitalizing times of my life. But this only came about by identifying who I was, where I was headed, and then taking a risk and trusting that God will get me where he wants me.●



A Freshman's View

I've been at IHMS for a little over a month, and so far it's been better than I could have imagined. I can

already see how the Seminary is helping me to gain a better prayer life and a closer bond with my fellow seminarians. The IHM Seminary does an excellent job of stressing the importance of these two things.

I came to the Seminary without a very structured prayer life. I had a lot of questions about what I should do, and at times I would struggle to keep a normal prayer routine. We all eat dinner as a community each night, so we get to know each other in a very open and friendly setting. We also have a lot of free time on weekends and during free weekends to do things outside of the seminary. I know that many of the friends I make here will be friends for the rest of my life and their support will help me make it through many of my struggles in the seminary. I love the seminary! I am looking forward to the next four years of my life! •

year and Fr. Ernster and “thirty-some” young men were squeezed into a single family home which the diocese had purchased as part of the land acquisition for construction of the present day Cathedral of the Sacred Heart. “I don’t know how we survived that year...it was so crowded,” recalls Fr. Ernster. But survive they did and in March of 1951, the first group of seminarians moved into Kelly Hall. Father Ernster adds, “One thing wasn’t ready...there were no curtains or shades on the windows. I had one of those corner rooms with windows on three sides; it was like living in a bird cage. Every couple of days, [Fr.] Speltz would remind us how important it was to turn off the light before we got ready for bed.”

Six young men, including Fr. Ernster, graduated from IHMS that first year. But in the end, Fr. Milo Ernster was the only man of the group that was ordained. He is the Class of 1955!

As Father Ernster gave a speech as the guest of honor at the Diocese of Winona’s Annual Clergy Days, he bragged about the Class of ‘55, “Now, let me tell you about the Class of ‘55. This is a good class! There’s a...a closeness that I don’t think any of you experience with your class. The Class of ‘55 is just as big, and alive, and active today as it was fifty years ago! There has been no one who died from the Class of ‘55. This is a good class.”

Father Ernster continued his speech by expressing his gratitude to God and to all those who have shared his journey. He closed his remarks as only Father Ernster could, “I’m grateful for so many things. But, what really excites me today is knowing that this great Class of ‘55 selected me to speak on behalf of the entire class today. It’s a good class!”

Indeed it is. Congratulations Father Milo Ernster! Joel Hennessy
