

Senior Perspective

In my four years at Immaculate Heart of Mary Seminary, I have experienced a

fraternity of brothers united in purpose and in action to become under the guidance and leadership of the Successor of St. Peter, fit instruments for the diffusion of the doctrine and grace of Christ in the hearts of men, for this we cannot help but give most fervent thanks to Almighty God for this abundance of divine vocations. However, answering God's call to a divine vocation is not easy; seminary life is often a difficult path to walk. Yet, we are encouraged by the words of Saint Paul; *I have strength for everything through Him who empowers* me (Philippians IV 13).

Christ said to the Apostles; You are the light of the world (Matthew V 14). This is, in the words of Pope Pius XII our destiny as men discerning a divine vocation to the priesthood; "To be supernatural sun to enlighten the minds of men with the truth of Christ, to inflame their hearts with the love of Christ." and that "if you are to be the light of truth, which comes from Christ, you must yourselves be first illuminated with that truth." We can do this by living our faith to the fullest, giving ourselves completely to the service of Christ and His Church. We must die to ourselves in humble submission to Christ the King. Yet, so often as we walk the path of discernment we lose sight of Christ the King, letting personal and worldly concerns become the center, the ruler, the king

of our lives. Echoing the call of the Israelites in the time before King Saul; But a king must rule us (I Samuel XII 12). At these times the Lord chastises us as He chastised the Israelites, reminding us that The Lord your God is your King (I Samuel XII 12).

Therefore, it is necessary to keep our focus on Christ, persevering in prayer as we continue to discern God's will in our lives. Only when we humbly prostrate ourselves before Our Lord and King can we hear His voice and be enlightened with the light of His truth, the truth which enables us to humbly submit our will to His, echoing the words of Our Most Holy Mother; *Fiat mihi secundum verbum tuum; May it be done to me according to your word (Luke I* 28).

Seminarian Reflects on Pope John Paul II's Impact

Twelve years ago I was a young and im-

pressionable 14-year-old man. I was sitting on the dusty ground in a canyon a few miles outside the city of Denver. I recall the events of that weekend as if they had just taken place. I was wearing a vinyl rain poncho and had to pull it over my head to shield myself from the rain beginning to fall.

I was reading "Jurassic Park," by Michael Crichton, trying to pass the few hours before nightfall. It was at that moment that I was struck by the enormity of my surroundings. While I was sequestered under my poncho, I could feel the presence of hundreds of thousands of people. At that time, I felt compelled to pull the poncho down, turn around and view the river of humanity that had formed behind me in the canyon.

The youth of the world were congregating for the celebration of Evening Prayer with the Holy Father, Pope John Paul II. As we were waiting, the helicopters transporting the Holy Father began to make their descent, and shortly after John Paul walked out on stage, greeting the thousands of pilgrims. However, the dynamic quality of the Holy Father made it seem like he was not greeting a group of people collectively; rather, he was greeting thousands, one person at a time. It was this personal connection I felt that day that I still remember these 12 years later.

Through the Holy Father, I felt a real connection both to the Lord Jesus and to his church. It was in this experience, World Youth Day in Denver, that I first felt called to discern the priesthood. Having been a seminarian for the past four years, I have been graced, on many occasions, to tell of the grace of my vocation.

Every time I begin my witness, I begin with the influence of John Paul II in my life. How can I explain the impact he had upon me? I found that his message stood in stark contrast with the message of the world. His gospel was one of freedom; not of MTV freedom, but the true freedom of Christ found through the living of a virtuous life.

He told me, and millions of others, that it was okay to be Christian: what a profound message this is. I feel that the Holy Father's message of freedom removed many obstacles in my life, allowing me a (Continued on Page 8)

clear path to the discernment of priest-hood.

Without the static of sin and deception offered from the world, I have been led to a relationship with Jesus. This relationship has flourished into a following of Jesus that has led me to the seminary. I, therefore, count John Paul II as my inspiration for entering the seminary and count my experiences of John Paul II among the most formative experiences that I have had or ever will.

What now? I have often pondered what I am to do now that John Paul II no longer walks among us with physical body. I remember the day following his death, I sat in chapel and felt that the community of Christians were missing a component that cannot now be replaced.

We are, in some way, less than what we were. It was in this moment that God revealed something to me: John Paul II is more accessible to me now than he was in life. He is no longer bound by the physical body, but we are now able to reap the fruits of the contributions of his prayer and intercession without the limitations of time and space: what an amazing insight the Lord gave me.

I cannot express how touched I was by the pilgrims holding the sign that read, "Santo Subito," or "Saint Immediately." I have little doubt that at sometime in the future, the church will recognize this gifted priest as a saint; however, I do not feel compelled to wait until that time to ask for his ad and his intercession.

Especially now during my time of seminary formation, I require the assistance and prayers of such as exemplary priest, a priest who changed my life. John Paul II taught us, for many years, not only what it means to be a priest, but also what it means to be Christian, and more fundamentally what I means to be human. If I can be a fraction of the man John Paul II was, my life will have been a success. However, to attain this success I ask him, now more than ever, to pray for his brothers and sisters, helping us to come to know God the Father, Jesus his only son, in and through their Holy Spirit, JP II, we love you!
