From a young age I was taught to love God and to seek out a personal relationship with him. I was taught that God wants us to seek Him out and to open ourselves to His love for us. They are from Oregon and thats where we lived until we moved to Wisconsin in 2004.

Shortly after moving we became Catholic. It was definitely an interesting transition for me. I liked being Catholic more because it was more ordered and had history behind it. However my faith wasn't really my own. This came to a head when I turned eighteen. I moved out of my parents house and started working full time. We had a big soccer game on Saturday, we had opportunities to run on the trails at the retreat center, to canoe, to play ping pong and do other activities. 

Fr. Jason Kern, priest of the Diocese of Winona, MN, entered Immaculate Heart of Mary Seminary in the fall of 2005. After a year of college at Bemidji State University Fr. Kern transferred to I.H.M. as a sophomore. "There was a want for something deeper", Fr. Kern recalled, "I had to give seminary a try". After three years at Immaculate Heart of Mary Seminary Fr. Kern went onto Theology School at Sacred Heart Seminary in Detroit, MI. He then received the sacrament of Holy Orders in June of 2012.

There were two particular things that helped him make the decision to take that leap of faith: first an illness within his family really made him consider what the bigger picture was in life, as he knew it, and secondly a trip to World Youth Day in 2002 in Toronto, Canada lit the fuse for a deeper love of Christ and the church, as well as a deeper desire for more intimate relationship.

During Fr. Kern's time here he was very impacted by the examples of the

seminary's former rector Fr. James Steffes and all the other priests on faculty. Also, Fr. Kern was spoke very highly of his professor's that he had for different philosophy and theology courses. He specifically mentioned Fr. Fabian, Dr. Susan Windley-Daoust, Dr. Kevin Rickert were some of the professors who left a positive impact on him.

Fr. Kern looks back very fondly on my time at I.H.M. The lessons Father says he learned from the seminary are, "how to be a man for Christ and of Christ and how to pray and open myself to the movements of grace". Fr. Kern is now the pastor of the Tri-Parish of St. Joseph, Good Thunder; St. Matthew, Vernon Center and St. Teresa, Mapleton.





Late this past September, there was a new sound heard round the city of Winona. Broadcasting straight out of St. Mary's University campus radio station, several of my seminarian brothers and I started our very own program. It has been a great opportunity for practicing the proper use of media.

Every Friday evening we get on air to bring good music and pleasant conversation to our campus through "The Minnesota Nice Hour." Several songs are played, followed by random segments that we add.
